

## OPEN BOOR CLINIC THE OPEN DOOR

Winter 2020 | Year 6 | Issue 1

I OFTEN refer to the Open Door Clinic as an absolute gem of an organization within the larger matrix of healthcare players in Addison County. Without a doubt, we all make valuable contributions to the well-being of our community, and face our own unique set of challenges; but our free clinic status allows us to practice with a certain amount of latitude that contributes to our ability to provide excellent care, comprehensive case management, and spend necessary time with our patients to meet their needs.

For instance, our model relies upon an incredibly dedicated and talented cohort of volunteers who see our patients at every clinic – not only do they come from all parts of Addison County, but we now have volunteers from Rutland and Chittenden Counties and who come from as far as South Hero to give their time and offer their expertise to our local population. Amazing!

We prioritize taking as much time as we can to see our patients, and provide extensive case management, which I feel is now becoming a buzzword in the context of "population health" but something that's at the center of what we've done for years. It transcends all programs and is an essential part of every patient encounter that we believe makes for critical differences in our patients' experiences and outcomes. And all of this is coordinated and managed by our competent, knowledgeable and highly committed staff who go to bat for our complicated patients time and time again.

So many people identify us with taking care of our local migrant worker population, which is completely understandable and true (we served 326 individuals in 2019), but I also want to remind our readers that we take care of even more Vermonters, the majority of whom work (73% in 2019) but face really difficult challenges and choices as they navigate decisions around work, health insurance, and taking care of themselves. As I have borne witness to some of their personal stories, I feel completely despondent at times and think that in 2020 it shouldn't be this hard – and require this much effort - for people to live and take care of themselves.

And yet it is.

We recently surveyed 10% of our new patients, which we have to

do twice a year for one of our funders.

to transition to a primary care office and obtain insurance. Just under half of the patients surveyed

reported that they still didn't have insurance because even with state and federal subsidies, premiums are unaffordable; and if individuals are able to purchase a plan, it's generally one with sky-high deductibles that won't address many of their chronic needs until they have paid between \$5,500 - \$7,900 out of pocket, crippling for two persons making \$50,730/year.

Thus, it will come as no surprise to learn that the need for our services is growing. Between 1/1/2019 and 12/31/2019, the clinic provided 1,550 medical and dental visits to 994 distinct patients, including 425 new patients. As compared to the same timeframe in 2018, this represents a 12% increase in distinct patients served, and an 8% increase in medical and dental visits provided. We are proud of the strides we've made within our dental program: last year, we held 50 dental clinics, our hygienist saw 69 patients over 317 procedures and our dental externs from the University of New England saw 41 patients for 183 acute and restorative procedures. We also continue to explore and offer some innovative mental health initiatives to more effectively address the growing needs of our patients.

Thank you for your continued generosity and commitment to our clinic and patients. With your help, we exceeded our expectations with our annual appeal, which will offset this year's deficit budget. As 2020 unfolds, we remain dedicated to serving our community through the breadth of our services and excellent care; and with the support of our partners, we remain proud of the immense impact that our small organization has on this community.







MEET MAREN WALSH, BY NICO PLUME


For five years in a row, the Open Door Clinic has been hosting an unpaid Middlebury College January-Term Intern. This January, we were thrilled to have Maren Walsh, a Senior Feb from Denver, Colorado, studying International and Global Studies. We feel super fortunate to have hosted her. Nico Plume, our 2019 summer/fall/winter intern, interviewed Maren for the newsletter.

66 NP: What are you involved in at Middlebury?

MW: I am an IGS major, with a focus in Latin America. I take a lot of Spanish, political science, and history classes, and last semester I started studying Portuguese as well, which has been super fun. I'm also involved with an a cappella group on campus, which is a great change of pace from studying. Lately I've really been enjoying getting to know Vermont better, which is part of the reason I wanted to work with the Open Door Clinic. Because I'm graduating soon, I want to make sure I take advantage of the opportunities the area has to offer.

NP: What are your first impressions of ODC?

MW: The main thing that has stood out to me so far is how nice everyone is. All of the ODC employees have been extremely welcoming to me, and I've loved getting to know other volunteers and patients. It's also really rewarding to be able to see how important the organization is for so many people in the area.

NP: When did you start to learn Spanish?

MW: I've been studying Spanish on and off since elementary school, but there have definitely been periods in there where I hardly ever used it. I started learning Spanish in a more serious way in high school when I went to Panama for an immersion program, and started to appreciate Spanish more as a way to connect with people than as just a subject in school. I started putting way more energy into it after that. I spent a few summers in the Dominican Republic and did some traveling over my feb-mester. I've also kept focusing on Spanish since I started at Middlebury. Last year I studied abroad in Cuba in the fall and Argentina in the spring.

NP: What has been your favorite part of working at ODC so far? What about your least favorite part?

MW: My favorite part has definitely been the people, as well as the opportunity to practice my Spanish in a meaningful way. My least favorite part is calling patients to tell them their appointment was canceled or moved to a different time. It's never fun to be the bearer of bad news.

NP: How do you envision that your time at the clinic will impact or play into your experience and education at Middlebury College?

MW: I've already been getting a lot out of this internship, including basic things, like office skills, making loads of phone calls, and learning how a health center works behind the scenes. It's also been a truly excellent opportunity to engage with people outside of the college. Sometimes it feels easy as a student to get sucked into the college bubble, but working at the ODC has helped me get out of that a little more. It's really helped me appreciate Vermont and all the diversity it has to offer, as well as enjoy my time on campus a little more.






